FIRE CHIEF

<u>Basic Function</u>: The Fire Chief directs all operations of the fire department; conducts interviews; makes hiring recommendations; supervises all fire department personnel; and delegates or develops policies & procedures to ensure compliance with federal, state and local ordinances.

<u>Supervision Received</u>: The Fire Chief shall operate under the general supervision of the Township Manager.

<u>Responsibilities and Duties</u>: An employee in this position may be called upon to do any or all of the following: (Employee may be expected to perform additional tasks as required.)

- 1. Plan and direct general supervision of departmental operations including but not limited to:
 - a. Making and reviewing all personnel assignments within the department.
 - b. Enforcing disciplinary policy and procedures.
 - c. Making recommendations for the appointment, promotion, and dismissal of fire department personnel.
 - d. Preparing and administering the departmental budget and maintaining expenditures within revenues provided.
 - e. Coordinating fire department activities with other municipal departments.
 - f. Supervising fire prevention activities.
 - g. Maintaining professional development by attending meetings, conferences, seminars, etc.
 - h. Recommending the purchase of new equipment and directing the drafting of specifications for the equipment.
 - i. Developing long term plans for improving and maintaining cost effective operations.
 - i. Responsible for delegation and/or completion of records and reports.
 - k. Supervising the maintenance, repair, improvement and replacement of firefighting equipment, radio equipment, and property of the fire department.
 - 1. Supervising in house programs for the training of firefighting personnel in modern methods of firefighting and in use and care of equipment.
 - m. Ensuring that an incident command system is used at all emergency operations.
 - n. Authorizing the release of information to the press.
- 2. Supervise, and perform as needed, firefighting activities including but not limited to:
 - a. Driving fire apparatus.
 - b. Operating pumps and related equipment, laying hose, and performing fire containment, extinguishment, and overhaul tasks.
 - c. Supervise and perform emergency medical services.
- 3. Perform related work as required.

<u>Desirable Qualifications for Employment</u>: An employee in this class, upon appointment, should have the equivalent of the following knowledge, training and experience.

- 1. A comprehensive knowledge of fire administration and management principles.
- 2. The ability to manage economically and efficiently.
- 3. The ability to plan and direct varied operations.
- 4. The ability to manage emergency situations.
- 5. The ability to work effectively with public officials, coworkers and the general public.
- 6. The ability to meet physical demands to successfully perform essential functions of this job:
 - a. The ability to sit, talk, hear, stand, walk, use hands and fingers, handle or operate objects, tools, or controls, and reach with hand and arms.
 - b. The ability to sit, climb, maintain balance, stoop, kneel, crouch, or crawl.
 - c. The ability to lift and/or move up to 25 pounds and occasionally lift and/or move in excess of 25 pounds.
 - d. Specific vision abilities including close vision, distance vision, color vision, peripheral vision, depth perception, and the ability to adjust focus.
- 7. An equivalent combination of education and experience listed below may be considered:
 - a. Knowledge normally acquired through the completion of an Associate's Degree in Fire Science, with a Bachelor's Degree preferred; or an equivalent combination of education and related training and experience.
 - b. Five (5) years of experience in fire service, two (2) of which must be in a command position.
 - c. Completion of the Michigan Firefighters Training Council Firefighter I & II, Fire Officer III, Hazardous Materials Operations. Appropriate level of licensure to meet the department license for EMS. Paramedic preferred.

Working Conditions:

- 1. Work is primarily in an office environment. Work may need to be performed in a vehicle, outdoor settings, in all weather conditions, including temperature extremes, during day and night.
- 2. Work is often performed in emergency situations, and may expose the employee to loud noises and hazards including smoke, noxious odors, fumes, chemicals, liquid chemicals, solvents and oils.
- 3. The employee may face potential exposure to bloodborne pathogen and communicable diseases while rendering emergency medical services.
- 4. Work can involve strenuous physical tasks during emergency, training, or station activities for prolonged periods of time under conditions of height, smoke and adverse weather.
- 5. The employee will occasionally work near moving mechanical parts, and in precarious places.
